Principal's Message

Thank you to all Willoughby families for your support of the school as we have managed the tragic events involving the Langford family.

Winona has been a much loved friend to many of your daughters and I know several of the girls have strong connections with Winona's brother, Jesse, and the young men from Knox who tragically died in the White Island volcano incident. Winona's mother, Kristine, has been an integral member of the parent-run music committee and a tireless worker in this role, supporting and fundraising at all school music performances. Jesse is a friend of many of our students and has been transferred from New Zealand and is recovering in hospital in Sydney.

I particularly wish to thank all members of our school community for ensuring the connection between Willoughby Girls High School and Winona was kept out of the media for over a week, out of respect for the privacy of the Langford family and friends. This also minimised the likelihood of media outlets approaching the girls who would not appreciate being met with cameras or microphones outside the school, when they are trying to come to terms with the tragedy of Winona and her family.

I released the following statement about the Langford family on Tuesday night, which has been published in the media:

The Willoughby Girls High School community is deeply saddened Winona is still unaccounted for. At this distressing time, the school community's thoughts and heartfelt sympathy are with her family and friends. The Department of Education and Willoughby Girls High School are working closely with students and staff to support them at this most difficult time. There is and will be ongoing extensive support in place for those impacted by this tragic event.

Smoking Ceremony

On Tuesday 16 December, Willoughby Girls High School held its first Welcome to Country ceremony by Cammeraygal elder Dr Dennis Foley. Dr Foley is a Professor at the University of Canberra whose research focuses on Indigenous enterprise. He welcomed the students and honoured guests including the Willoughby Mayor, School Education Director and representatives of the community and schools in the local area. Dr Foley shared his personal experiences of growing up as an Aboriginal person on the northern beaches of Sydney and answered student questions. He explained how the local traditional community was a matriarchal society and the hill tops were special places for women. He noted that Willoughby Girls High School was in a very appropriate location for female learning and ceremony.

Dr Foley then performed the school's first Smoking Ceremony around the new building to ready it for opening and use in 2020. He finished with a powerful message asking youth to oppose racism in all its forms and work towards reconciliation.

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Year 10 Science Project

Once again Year 10 students participate in the Annual Science Project which is run with the support of the University of New South Wales.

Students work in teams to investigate a question of personal interest and prepare a presentation of their findings to their class. A project from each class is selected to be presented to the entire grade and a panel of judges, including scientist's Dr Rebecca LeBard, Dr Michael Janitz and Dr Chris Marquis, decide on the winning group.

There was a range of topics studied including:

- Which earrings corrode more easily?
- How can chewing gum be removed from desks?
- Are natural hair dye treatments effective?
- Can the toppings in bubble tea actually be digested?
- How can the fermentation of cabbage be accelerated?

The winning group, as judged by the panel, looked at the effectiveness of a range of soap brands.

Year 9 Cross Curricular PBL

On the 12 December, Year 9 presented an exhibition on many different endangered species and how we can save our chosen animals. There were around 50 groups presenting their projects in the hall to invited guests and students. In our groups, we had to research different aspects of our animals. Some of these included their habitat, diet and population in the different places that they are found.

My group (Mia, Aggie and April) chose to pick snow leopards. We wanted to do something related to the snow as it is different from the environment that we live in. After our research, we used it to design a solution to help save our species. Our solution was to limit the number of permits for the hikers in parts of the snow leopard's habitat during the breeding season. We also decided that we would recruit former poachers and employ them to protect rather than kill the leopards. This technique was already used for pangolins and was very successful.

Overall, this project was very engaging, informative and gave me an understanding about how important it is to save our endangered species before it is too late.




