PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Year 7 Learning Conferences

It was lovely to finally welcome our Year 7 families to the school at last night's Student Learning Conferences. The conferences are a different kind of parent-teacher interview and last night's event was the first time we have run these at Willoughby Girls High School. The aim of the sessions was for families to learn how their daughters are settling into secondary school and how they are managing with the different routines and the range of subjects.

The students were at the centre of the meetings: they selected 3 to 5 pieces of work they have produced this year along with their learning log, and presented these to parents and carers for discussion. One of the girls' teachers chaired the meeting and their role was to encourage the student and provide information about how she is managing across all her subjects.

Prior to the conferences, Teachers met at length to share information about students' progress and engagement, and to ensure they had a strong understanding of each student in a range of contexts. This provided an additional opportunity for teachers to broaden their knowledge and understanding of the girls in their classes as each student demonstrates different strengths in different subjects.

The overall response to the evening was very positive, however, we know we can improve this process. We will survey all parents / carers, students and teachers shortly to gain feedback to inform future planning.

The next opportunity for Year 7 parents to engage directly with the school is the **P&C's Year 7 Welcome Evening, scheduled for 23 July.** This Welcome event is usually held early in Term 1 but COVID restrictions prevented this. We look forward to meeting Year 7 parents and carers again and to welcoming those who were unable to attend last night.

SRC Activities

The Student Representative Council recently surveyed students about the school uniform, wellbeing matters, and the school's outdoor areas. At least 50% in each Year group responded with 66% of Year 8 students and 69% of Year 9 students responding. Some very valuable data was gathered and the next step is for the SRC representatives and their teacher coordinators, Ms Carruthers and Ms Stringer, to develop recommendations for the school's Executive Team to consider and plan how to enact as many as practicable.

I will be on leave for the last three weeks of Term 2 and the first three weeks of Term 3. Mrs Jennifer Watts will replace me as Relieving Principal and Mr Clem Burgmann will relieve in Mrs Watts' Deputy Principal role.

SUBJECT SELECTION PROGRAM FOR YEAR 10 STUDENTS

Decisions about **subject selection for 2022 Year 11** are very important.

To assist students and parents, Willoughby Girls High School will conduct:

- a Subject Selection Program for Year 10 students from Tuesday 13 to Thursday 15 July 2021 during normal school lesson time*,
- and a **Year 10 Subject Information Evening** early next term (date to be advised). Parents and guardians will receive an email invitation and details about the evening later in the term.

*Note: During the three days, the Year 10 students will also be sitting for their <u>HSC Minimum Standard</u> tests.

The Year 10 Subject Selection program will provide relevant information to assist students who will enter Year 11 in 2022. In particular, it will focus on issues related to the award of the NSW Higher School Certificate including requirements, assessment, the UAC and VET courses.

As English is the only compulsory subject for the HSC, students entering Year 11 in 2022 have some very important decisions to make regarding their subject selections. The Senior School Curriculum Booklet for Year 11 2022 and Year 12 2023 will be emailed to students and parents early next term. In the same email, a link for the subject selection process will be provided.

Relevant links, such as UAC, NESA and curriculum, will be emailed to parents/guardians soon. Hopefully parents/guardians will gain a better understanding about the Higher School Certificate, promoting and allowing informative discussions with your daughters in the upcoming holidays.

Students in Year 10 are encouraged to start thinking about their subject selections for 2022. Students should choose subjects they have an interest in, suit their capability and their future career aspirations. Students and parents should seek as much advice as possible before making any decisions regarding subject choices. Teachers, Head Teachers, Year Advisers and the Careers Adviser can all assist in this process.

YEAR 9 WELLBEING TERM 2

Year 9 have been working on developing their wellbeing in our Wellbeing Monday Homeroom sessions. This term, in homerooms, students have been working on daily planners, goal setting, sleep routines and mindful movement. Students have particularly enjoyed their "Chair Yoga" sessions! Year 9's "Funday Friday Dance Off" will also return later this term with a lunchtime showcase in Week 10.

Later this term we will be having our Wellbeing Day. Students will participate in a workshop with Ysafe who are Australia's leading provider of cyber safety education. Students will hear from child psychologists and ex-police officers who specialise in cyber safety.

They will engage in a STAY SAFE Personal Safety Self Defence workshop by the Sydney Self Defence Centre which will teach empowerment, effective decision making, conflict resolution, body language and physical self defence. The program also includes coping techniques, relaxation, effective communication, teamwork and fear management.

A live theatre performance "The Hurting Game" from Brainstorm Productions will provide strategies for resilience, help-seeking, online safety and positive relationships, supported by a Q&A.

We will have some follow up activities next term to explore how the students have continued their wellbeing journeys.




YEAR 9 FRENCH



YEAR 10 TVET EXPLAINED

If your daughter/ward is looking to use a Vocational, Education and Training course as part of their school plan for the HSC there are TAFE information sessions available online. Vocational Training is usually delivered by TAFE and are called TVET courses. (TAFE delivered VET courses)

Some of these courses are deemed ATAR eligible by NESA, meaning students must complete all work and Workplacement hours, and sit the HSC exam for this subject. There are some rules around this regarding the calculation of these courses with students' other subjects.

Remember this is an externally provided course and the school does not teach your child/ward. These courses are delivered off-site or online by TAFE teachers usually on a Tuesday afternoon 2-6pm and contribute to the students HSC units. Depending on the WGHS school timetable and subject selection, there may be clashes that also arise with offerings at this time.

The school will interview interested students also to see whether the course is suitable for the student's skill level and goals for the HSC.

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WORK EXPERIENCE FOR YEAR 10 IN TERM 4

Work Experience for Year 10 will be going ahead this year, albeit later than usual - Term 4, Week 9 (Monday to Friday) 29 November – 3 December 2021. The decision to delay this year's Work Experience has happened to allow Business and industry more time to regroup and organise staff after a year of significant change and COVID Restrictions.

I have posted all the forms and guidelines required for Work Experience by the DET on to students GOOGLE Classroom page and have asked them to share them with you. Alternatively you can find the information:

- and in the information note being sent home with students and emailed to parents and carers.

Typically you will need to read the Parent/Carer Guide and complete and sign the Student Placement Record (SPR) section.

The Host employer will need to be issued with the Employer Guide, the Students Placement Record and the Certificate of Insurance.

Parents and students, please submit the Work experience forms as soon as they are completed to ensure administration of the program runs smoothly. It is vital that all paperwork submitted is accurate to enable the Department's insurance to correctly cover students and their activities.

There are no scheduled lessons for the work experience week and we envisage that all students will be placed at a workplace or volunteering agency. Teachers will contact students via telephone or visit the workplace where possible to check on their progress.

If there are problems before, during or after the work placement, please contact Ms Morris at School Monday - Friday. An information note will be given to students next week.

YEAR 11 IN FIRST GRADE!




YEAR 8 GEOGRAPHY
