YEAR 10 MENTAL HEALTH INITIATIVE

This week our Year 10 students began a three-week YAMS - "Youth Aware of Mental Health" initiative. This is a school-based program conducted by the Black Dog Institute for young people which focuses on raising student awareness of mental health and

discussing strategies for dealing with mental health issues. Topics include dealing with relationships with peers and adults, changes in mood, to feeling sad or facing a stressful situation. As a group, the students reflect on how they might feel if faced by such events and discuss how to handle real-life situations.

- Black laced college shoes (Sandshoes, sandals, boots, shoes with higher heels and sneakers are NOT permitted for safety reasons, eg Technology Rooms, Science Laboratories)
- Royal blue pants (optional)
- White skivvy (optional) under white blouse
- Royal blue jumper with V-neck and school crest
- Navy or black scarf (optional)
- Navy or black gloves (optional)
- Black school coat (optional)
- Tie (Year 12 Prefects only)

WHOLE SCHOOL LITERACY ASSESSMENT TASK



On Tuesday 3 May, every student from Years 7-11 completed a Literacy Assessment task. Part of the collected data will be used for the annual EAL/D survey. This is one of our strategies to ensure no student's learning is overlooked. These tests are being assessed by our EAL/D teachers who will offer additional assistance to students who could benefit from their expertise.

YEAR 12 FEEDBACK WEEK

Our Willoughby girls are very lucky. Every year, they participate in Feedback Week which is the opportunity to practise sitting exams under exam conditions, and then be given feedback by teachers on what they should work on to improve their answers when they next sit exams such as the Trials and the HSC exams, as well as their exam techniques and revision plans.

This year we held 44 exams. Most were in the hall. Well done to the Year 12 students and thank you to the teachers who created the exams and are now marking them and providing detailed feedback.

MINIMUM STANDARD TESTING - YEARS 11 & 12

For all students who have not yet completed their compulsory Minimum Standards tests in Writing, Reading and Numeracy, please see Ms Atchison to register for a test. All catchup test sessions are held on Tuesday mornings (period 0) and afternoons (period 7) in Room 5.

NAPLAN – YEARS 7 & 9

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills. All Students in NSW in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in these annual tests in Writing, Reading, Conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy.

WGHS students will complete NAPLAN on the following days:

	- Year 7 Writing
	- Year 7 Reading
Thursday 12 May	- Year 9 Reading
	- Year 7 Language
Friday 13 May	- Year 9 Language
	- Year 7 Numeracy

All students are required to bring their head sets and fully charged laptops, with the locked down browser installed on these days.

The most interesting thing I have learned in PBL this term is how to create a good presentation and how to become a more confident presenter. Eleanor V


I enjoy working with people and learning how to solve problems. Amelia S

On Thursday 5 May, after a three-year wait, the school's musicians finally returned to Chatswood RSL Club for our heat in the North Shore High Schools Music Spectacular. This 'annual' event hasn't been held since 2019 due to Covid, so for many of our students and their parents it was their first experience of one of the biggest events on our musical calendar. Five ensembles and four Year 12 soloists graced the stage, and the large audience was very appreciative of the performers' quality and enthusiasm.

Senior Wind Ensemble have a great 'ensemble' sound, despite all those zoom rehearsals over the past two years, and it's great to hear how our most experienced musicians make things work in such a small number of rehearsals. The night ended on a high with Jazz Ensemble, and Charli R in Year 12 really getting the feet tapping with her take on Michael Bublé's "Haven't Met You Yet".

As always, our Year 12 soloists shone brightly – Abbey T was in her element with an amazing musical theatre performance; McKenzie R brought some cool jazz vocals to the room; Alisia Y showed her virtuosic piano skills; and Abby C played the Saint-Saëns cello concerto with real power.

At the end of the night, the adjudicators chose Chamber Ensemble, Senior Wind Ensemble and Abby C to represent us at the final of the Music Spectacular, which will be held on Saturday 14 May at Killara High School.



Congratulations to those performers, and to everyone who took part on Thursday evening. Thank you also to the many families who volunteered their time and their cars to transport a huge amount of equipment to and from the venue from school – we literally couldn't have done it without you!

Our History Teacher, Mr Zapf is one of Australia's amazing war veterans.




