#### **COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE**

Regular school attendance is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. When your child attends school everyday, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other students.



Education is compulsory for children in NSW between the ages of 6 and 17 years, and the Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

#### **SCHOOL UNIFORM**

School uniforms identify students with a particular school and give the students a sense of belonging to the school population. Uniform also helps students understand the importance of wearing appropriate attire. Willoughby Girls High School and its community are committed to the wearing of school uniform.

Students are required to wear full school uniform every day, including when on excursions and during examination periods.

#### WEARING SPORTS UNIFORM

PDHPE - The sports uniform may only be worn in PDHPE sports lessons and during scheduled sporting activities. This applies to all students (Years 7 to 11).

WEDNESDAY SPORT - Years 9 to 11 are reminded that they are required to wear full school uniform to school on Wednesdays, recommencing Term 3. Grade sport participants can change into their sports uniform at recess on Wednesday. All other students participating in House or recreational sports are to change into their sports uniform at lunchtime.

### NO JEWELLERY, NAIL POLISH OR BRIGHTLY COLOURED HAIR

In addition, no form of jewellery may be worn apart from studs or sleepers where a student has pierced ears. Makeup, nail polish or brightly dyed hair is not permitted at school. Adhering to the uniform policy is an important part of belonging to Willoughby Girl's High School.

#### **UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS – WINTER**

Please ensure all uniform items are labelled with a student's name.

#### Junior Uniform: (Years 7 - 10)

- A-line pinafore tunic in school check
- Long sleeved white blouse with collar (Knit or other style shirts are NOT acceptable)
- White skivvy (optional) under white blouse with long sleeves
- Royal blue jumper with V-neck and school crest
- Royal blue blazer with school crest
- Short white socks covering the ankle or black stockings (with black socks if desired)
- Black laced college shoes
- Optional: Navy scarf, navy gloves, Black School coat



#### Senior School Uniform: (Years 11 and 12)

- Royal blue skirt
- White blouse with collar and school letters (Knit or other style shirts are NOT acceptable)
- White skivvy (optional) under white blouse
- Royal blue jumper with V-neck and school crest
- Senior blue blazer with school crest
- Short white socks covering the ankle or black stockings
- Black laced college shoes (Sandshoes, sandals, boots, shoes with higher heels and sneakers are NOT permitted for safety reasons)
- Winter tie (Year 12 Prefects only)
- Optional: Year 12 Jersey, Navy scarf, Navy gloves, Black School Coat



- · Regulation blue long pants are available from the Uniform Shop and may be worn with school blouse throughout the year.
- · A cotton jumper is available to order for students who are allergic to wool.

#### What should students do if they are cold?

It is recommended that students wear undergarments that can protect them from the cold in the winter months. These include stockings and underwear such as singlets and thermal underwear, which cannot be seen above their uniforms. The school sports jacket can be worn over the formal school uniform if the school pullover is not an option, or alternatively, the Black School coat.

#### SUBJECT SELECTION PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS IN YEAR 10

Decisions about subject selections for 2023 Year 11 are very important. To assist students and parents with this important decision, we will conduct a Subject Selection

Program for Year 10 students from Tuesday 19 to Friday 22 July 2022 during normal school lesson time, and a Year 10 Subject Information Evening on Tuesday 26 July 2022. Parents/guardians will receive details about the evening later in the term.

Note: During the four days, the Year 10 students will also be sitting for their HSC Minimum Standard tests.

This Year 10 Subject Selection program will provide information to assist students who will enter Year 11 in 2023. In particular, it will focus on issues related to the award of the NSW Higher School Certificate including; requirements, assessment, the UAC and VET courses.



As English is the only compulsory subject for the HSC, students entering Year 11 in 2023 have some very important decisions to make regarding their subject selections. The Senior School Curriculum Booklet for Year 11 2023 and Year 12 2024 will be emailed to students and parents early next term. In the same email, a link for the subject selection process will be provided.

Relevant links, such as UAC, NESA and curriculum, will be emailed to parents/guardians soon. Hopefully parents/guardians will gain a better understanding about the Higher School Certificate, promoting and allowing informative discussions with your daughters in the holidays.

Students in Year 10 are encouraged to start thinking about their subject selections for 2023, students should choose subjects which they have an interest in, suit their capability and their future career aspirations. Students and parents should seek as much advice as possible before making any decisions regarding subject choices. Teachers, Head Teachers, Year Advisers and the Careers Adviser can all assist in this process. If you have any further questions, please feel free to contact the school. Thank you.

#### SUBJECT SELECTION FOR STUDENTS IN YEAR 8

A Subject Information Evening (Year 8 into 9) will be on **Tuesday 19 July 2022**, providing information to assist students who will enter Year 9 in 2023. Parents/guardians will receive details about the evening later this term. The evening will focus on issues related to the award of the NSW Record of Student Achievement (RoSA) including; requirements, grading and assessment and the subject selection process.

As well as the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Science, Geography, History and PDHPE, each student must choose three elective subjects to be studied in Years 9 and 10.

#### YEAR 11 PDHPE FIRST AID TRAINING

On Monday 30 May, Year 11 PDHPE took part in a day of First Aid Training in which we, as students, had the opportunity to further enhance our knowledge and understanding of First Aid, which covers the practical aspects of our PDHPE First Aid elective. We thoroughly enjoyed the day, learning new skills to obtain our Senior First Aid Certificate!

After completing a series of modules created by The Royal Life Saving Society (Australia), we were able to gain an understanding of a diverse range of components regarding First Aid; including resuscitation, patient assessment, respiratory emergencies, anaphylaxis and bleeding and wounds. By learning the theory components, we were able to perform the practicals with ease and confidence on the training day.

Having received our first aid kits, we began the day by practicing resuscitation processes on both adult and infant mannequins, which was challenging but definitely worthwhile and educative!

As we progressed through the day, we became well aware of how to treat different health conditions and injuries, before ending the day off with practising a real-life first aid scenario. Practising the different scenarios allowed us to perform first aid techniques with more confidence, as it provided us with insight of what such situations could look like!

I'm sure my fellow classmates would agree with me that the day would be of huge benefit in the future and we would be able to say strongly that we can treat first aid! I would like to thank Ms Best, our PDHPE teacher for coordinating such an enriching experience.

Grace C stood out at the carnival, throwing 21 metres in the discus and running in the 15s relay who came second in the race, among many more successful achievements.



## YEAR 8 SEWING SECRET AGENT BAGS


Lily Z and Trinity (8TEM6)

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#### FIRST STUDENT TO REPRESENT WGHS AND GRADUATE FROM TDP






### YEAR 11 MASTER CHEF MYSTERY BOX

## Compulsory school attendance

### Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

## What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

## The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- · Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

## What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- · being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



#### **NSW Department of Education**

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

#### Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

## My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

#### What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

· Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

## What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

#### Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.
