

YEAR 10 SUBJECT SELECTION

A Subject selection link was emailed to all students in Week 3 and they must complete the online subject selection process by Week 5, Friday 19 August with a signed PDF of the form returned to Ms Atchison's office by Friday 26 August 2022.



YEAR 11 FINAL EXAMINATIONS

Our Year 11 students will sit their Yearly examinations from Thursday 1 September to Monday 12 September 2022. All exams will be at school. For exams where lots of students are involved, such as English and Mathematics, students should arrive half an hour before the start time of the exam so students can be seated on time. For smaller exams, students should arrive 20 minutes before the start time. Students who are Covid positive, or showing any flu-like symptoms, should not attend, and should follow assessment protocols for Illness and Misadventure. Students should wear full school uniform. YEAR 11 DISCONTINUATION OF SUBJECTS

Time is of essence for doing well in the HSC, so it is worthwhile students thinking about if they would like to discontinue any subjects. This important decision preferably needs to be made by the **end of Term 3** with discontinuation starting from Term 4. To discontinue a subject, parents must email the school attention Janet Atchison. If students need guidance with this decision, they should talk to the relevant teachers or me.

YEAR 11 EXTENSION SUBJECTS

WGHS offers students the opportunity to study HSC extension units in English (Extension 2), Mathematics (Extension 2), History, Science, Music, French and Japanese. Interested students should discuss their interest with Head Teachers, who will assist them to sign up if it is appropriate by **Friday 16 September** (Week 9). Extension subjects will start in Term 4.

YEAR 12 TRIALS UNDERWAY

Our Year 12 students will finish their Trial Examinations on Monday 15 August. They should return to school on Tuesday 16 August for their final chapter of their high school journey.

YEAR 7 LANGUAGE CHOICES FOR YEAR 8 2023

In Year 8, students study a language in addition to their core subjects of English, Mathematics, Science, Geography, Personal Development/ Health/Physical Education,

Design and Technology, Visual Arts, Music and Sport. Students must choose ONE language subject: Japanese or French.

A subject selection link will be emailed to students in Week 5, Tuesday 16 August 2022. The on-line selection process must be completed by Week 7, Monday 29 August 2022 with a signed form returned to Mrs Prowle's office by Monday 5 September 2022. We will have a year meeting with Year 7 next week to outline the process and members of the Language faculty with talk to the students about the language options.

The flyer pictured was emailed to parents and students during the week. Please discuss the options with your daughter, then carefully select the subject she would like to study. If you have any questions or concerns, please email the school.

YEAR 8 INTO YEAR 9 2023 SUBJECT SELECTION

A subject selection link was emailed to all students in Week 3 and they must complete the online subject selection process by Week 5, Friday 19 August with a signed PDF of the form returned to Through learning languages, students engage in purposental communication and reflect on the heritage, culture and identity of themselves and others. The study of one or more additional languages strengthens literacy skills in a student's first language, and supports participation in the global community.

What dos students learn?

Students interact with others in French or Japanese to exchange information and ideas on topics of interest, and engage in collaborative tasks and activities that involve making plans and arrangements.

They identify main ideas and specific information in a range of written, spoken and digital texts, and respond in French, Japanese or English to information and ideas, in a range of formats for specific contexts.

They compose informative and imaginative texts for different purposes and audiences, using known linguistic structures with the support of stimulus materials and modefield language, and create bilingual texts and learning resources for the classroom.

Why learn French

French is the living and working language of over 300 million people in the world. There are 40 countries which use French as their official language.

Learning French improves your capacity to think and problems solve. It is a great language if you wish to travel and you like learning about French culture.

Why learn Japanese

Japanese is the official language of Japan, one of Australia's northern neighbours in the Asia region. Students engage with elements of modern Japan, including popular culture such as anime, manga, pop music and fashion, as well as with the rich cultural tradition of this part of Asia.


YEAR 11 STUDENTS REVIEWED THE GOVERNMENT'S ROLE

MANAGING EXPECTATIONS



Top 10 Tips for parents to manage and communicate expectations about schoolwork and results

If parental expectations are too low, students may not strive to achieve their personal best. If parental expectations are too high, this can contribute to high levels of student stress. So how can parents find the right balance? Some areas to consider are:

- 1. Understand your own motivations: Why do you want your child to achieve particular marks in their studies? Is it because you have pressure from family/friends/society about what your child will achieve? Do you want them to follow in your career footsteps? Do you want them to have opportunities you never had as a child or young person? Understanding your own motivations will help you find balance in your expectations of your children.
- 2. Help your children to set realistic goals: Keep talking to your children about what they want to achieve, in individual subjects, at school overall and in other aspects of their life. Their career goals may mean they want to focus intensively on something like art or music, rather than maths or science. Helping them to identify their goals will enable them to determine what subjects they need to focus on and what marks they are likely to need, which means that effort can be concentrated on the areas which will help them to achieve their goals.
- Be involved in your children's learning:
 Throughout the term talk to your children about what they are studying. Ask them to show you their bookwork and homework. The more you understand about what they are doing and how they are going along the way, the better you will be able to set and manage your expectations.
- 4. Make sure you really communicate what you expect: Many students feel like they are not meeting their parents' expectations. Often this is a result of poor communication about expectations by both parties. Reflect on your motivations (see 1 above) and think about how you communicate your expectations to your children. Remember to praise them for the effort they make rather than the results they achieve, this way they are motivated to keep on trying, even when learning is difficult.
- assessment and reporting structures:
 Assessment and reporting systems change over
 time and are different in different schools, states and
 countries. Making sure you really understand what
 your children's reports mean may help you to
 understand what they are actually achieving.
 Sometimes students are excelling in certain skills or

areas, but reporting structures may not highlight

these

Develop an understanding of the school's

- Remember nobody is perfect: Even the brightest, most highly motivated child will struggle at times. They may struggle to understand a particular topic or concept, or they may struggle with motivation, particularly for a subject they don't particularly enjoy. Problems with teachers or peers can also contribute. It is unrealistic that anyone can work with 100% effort all the time.
- Provide practical homework and exam support:
 Provide practical help to your children with things
 like proofreading and reviewing drafts, checking
 work and listening to speeches. Remember though,
 it is not your work, so don't make changes, rather
 make suggestions and provide guidance.
- 8. Spend time together doing something fun: Make sure your relationship with your child is about more than homework and study. Allocate some time to do fun things together. This is the time in which your child is most likely to open up to you about the things that they are struggling with and you can work out how best to help them. Ideas include going for a walk or run together, having a dinner date (even to Maccas) or having them show you the latest funny videos they like.
- Support your child to do their best: You can do
 this by providing healthy, nutrient rich food;
 opportunities for exercise, rest and relaxation and an
 environment which is supportive of and conducive to
 study.
- 10. Keep alert for the physical and mental signs of stress: Familiarise yourself with how your child responds to stress. Do they withdraw? Act out? Work harder or stop working? When you notice that your child is stressed provide them opportunities to discuss what is worrying them and work with them to identify how you can help them. You may wish to involve the school counsellor, a teacher or tutor at this point.
